For the purpose of receiving the orderly comments from all speakers desiring to address City business before Council, adopts the following policy:

- Any speaker addressing Council shall complete a Speaker Slip to be turned in prior to the start of the mee7ng.
- Any speakers who have public comments at the end of the mee7ng do not have to have a Speaker Slip but they do still need to provide their name and address.
- Please note that all public comments should pertain to City of Bexley business only.
- All reasonable comments must be made within a maximum of three (3) minutes when addressing City Council.
- Undue interrup7on or other interference with the orderly conduct of remarks is not permitted.
- Defamatory or abusive remarks are always out of order.
- If the subject of the comment is not on the Council Agenda, the public may discuss the City issue during the Public Comments portion of the mee7ng. If the subject of the comment is on the Council Agenda, the public may discuss the issue at the 7me the issue is addressed during the Council mee7ng.
- Violation of this policy may result in termination of the speaker's comments and/or removal from the mee7ng.
- President of Council reserves the right to limit the length and scope of all Public Comments.
