Building and Zoning Department Update

Matt worked closely with Kathy to learn the ropes in his first weeks, but he has also already stepped out as a leader, implementing several measures to improve efficiency and streamline processes, including the creation of online inspection requests, resolution of many backlogged applications, and implementation of new response time standards for his department.

In adding to the new faces on the City team, Chief Lewis and I were thrilled to celebrate the successful graduation of our two newest police recruits from the OSHP police academy. Officer Shih and Officer Heston graduated with aplomb, with Officer Shih achieving top academic marks in his class and being selected to speak on behalf of the 150th class at the ceremony. LinkUs Bexley Open House -August 15 at 5:00 pm

As engineering for the East Main Street segment of the bus rapid transit (BRT) line progresses toward 60%, City staff continue to meet biweekly with COTA and consultants Kimley Horn to work through Bexley-specific design elements. Recently, staff hosted an internal working group with select Council representatives and the Bexley Chamber of Commerce to review current plans and the results of an in-depth lane configuration analysis. As a follow-up to that meeting, the City has requested additional data regarding ridership (current and projected), as well as more information on the proposed station location at Drexel and Main.

Additionally, MORPC recently released preliminary project proposals for inclusion in a 5-year Transit Supportive Infrastructure (TSI) capital improvement plan, which would be funded through the half-of-a-percent sales tax increase tied to the fall LinkUs ballot initiative. If the ballot measure is approved by voters, multiple Bexley projects would be funded including \$750,000 toward pedestrian and cyclist improvements at the Main Street/Alum Creek bridge and \$1.67 million toward Bexley's local match for the Livingston Avenue streetscape and safety improvement project.

The first murals on Main Street as part of Bexley's long-awaited Mural Festival will come to life in just a few short weeks. Martha's mural will be installed on the western elevation of Anthony Thomas Chocolates, a building owned by her sister, Marjorie Gallagher.

Later this month, wall prep (power washing and priming) will be underway at the other mural sites including Rubino's Pizza, 2nd Glance Hair and Nails, WesBanco, and Bexley Square. The Festival itself will feature celebrations of art from Thursday, September 19 to Saturday, September 21. On Saturday, don't miss the "Artist Alley," showcasing local arts and crafts for sale. Livingston Avenue Update


While Livingston is within Columbus' physical footprint/jurisdiction, The City of Bexley continues to be firmly and actively rooted in working towards a vision of a safer Livingston Avenue corridor for all residents and users. Following a multiyear public engagement process, the Cities of Bexley and Columbus adopted the Joint Livingston Avenue Plan. The plan provides a framework for a more safe and accessible Livingston Avenue, with cooperative economic development and land use policies focused on revitalizing the corridor and surrounding neighborhoods of Bexley, Berwick, Eastmoor, and Driving Park.

Here are a couple of updates on where things stand:

- Bexley partnered with Columbus to apply for and receive a federal grant to fund the major infrastructure work needed to see through the Livingston Avenue Plan
- It's the largest grant the City of Bexley has ever received over \$13 million in funding
- The funding will provide bike paths, wider tree lawns, safer sidewalks and crosswalks, and physical dividers/medians in the center of the street between College and Kellner. Additionally, it will provide new crosswalks, better connection to the Alum Creek bike way, and improvements to the streetscape in the commercial portion between College and Alum Creek Drive.
- This is an approx. 7 year project. The long timeline is because this requires extensive engineering and planning, and it is ambitious in what it aims to do. There isn't a way to expedite this timeline it is informed both by the scope of prep work needed as well as the federal process for the funding.
- The engineering project for the Livingston Avenue infrastructure project kicked off late last fall, and progress continues. The initial survey work has been completed; utilities have been identified; and base mapping is underway. With this information, preliminary alignment designs will be crafted, expected by November. This provides the first real sense of how the engineering design is lining up against the Joint Livingston Avenue Plan design. The incredibly detailed alignment design will continue to be tweaked throughout 2025, and environmental investigation will then begin. Right of way acquisition will follow plan finalization, and that phase will lead into the construction phase at the end of this decade. While timing is being driven in part by the complexity of the planning and engineering process, another key driver is the federal funding calendar, which specifies the release of construction funds beginning in 2029.
- All of these improvements are based upon the Joint Livingston Avenue Plan
- Bexley also recently zoned the commercial district to conform to the Joint Livingston Avenue Plan, elevating standards and ensuring specifications are compatible with the push for better pedestrian buffers, wider sidewalks, etc.

We understand that improving Livingston also means shorter term improvements. Those include the recent road diet. We also recently (earlier this summer) met with Columbus police command to advocate for additional speed enforcement in the corridor, and have since touched base with them regarding accidents that have occurred this symmer. We do frequent litter pick ups and business checks. We will continue to ask for more attention to the corridor and facilitate its improvement.

I am working on organizing a public forum to provide a comprehensive update and a Q&A, tentatively set for the evening of October 1, and we are inviting the City of Columbus to participate and present at this forum. Keep an eye out for more info soon!
