



Summer is in full swing, and if you've spent time around Bexley lately, you've likely seen it: packs of kids gliding through the neighborhood on bikes, scooters, and skateboards—sometimes electric, sometimes not—joyfully, and often fearlessly. It's a scene I love, but it's also one that increasingly gives me pause. I want to take a moment to talk about riding safely, especially as it pertains to our youngest and most vulnerable residents.

As these personal mobility devices have grown in popularity and complexity, we've seen a rise in risky behavior involving them. From riding e-bikes at excessive speeds without helmets to darting through intersections on e-scooters without looking, the potential for serious injury—or worse—is real.







Don't have a helmet? Let us help! The City of Bexley partners with <u>DARN</u> on the ReCycle Bikes program; a program that accepts and fixes donated bikes, and gets them in the hands of families and kids in need in our community. ReCycle Bikes also offers free helmets to those who need them. I'd be delighted to personally drop one off myself if you're short one! If you're in need of a helmet, drop me a line at *mayor@bexley.org*.

That's one of the reasons why Bexley recently expanded our bicycle helmet law to better protect our youth. Under the new law, any person under the age of 18 riding a bike, scooter, skateboard, or other recreational mobility devices in Bexley is required to wear a helmet. This isn't about enforcement for enforcement's sake—it's about working to avoid tragedies that are all too preventable. Wearing a helmet significantly reduces the risk of head injury in crashes. This simple step can save a life.

Meanwhile, many parents and young people may not realize that under Ohio state law, the operation of certain classes of e-bikes by minors is illegal. Specifically, Class 3 e-bikes (which can reach speeds of 28 mph) cannot be operated by anyone under 16, even with a helmet. Moreover, riding any type of

motorized scooter or e-bike on sidewalks is illegal in most public settings and especially dangerous in pedestrianheavy environments like Bexley's Main Street corridor.

Unfortunately, the current regulatory environment is a patchwork, leaving many families and kids unsure of what's

legal, safe, or age-appropriate. And the risk isn't just hypothetical; there have already been several injuries in Bexley this year involving youth on electric personal mobility devices.

Over the coming months, you'll see us address the risk posed by the increase in reckless behavior from a variety of angles. We'll be launching several educational campaigns around the laws we have today; later this summer we'll roll out operation "Slow Down Bexley" a driver-education and intervention campaign designed to help curb speeding and attention issues; and I'm also currently in the process of working with City Council to take a closer look at the operation of motorized vehicles by minors. We need to bring common sense clarification to what is permitted on Bexley's streets and sidewalks, address safety concerns, and ensure that we're holding space for both innovation and public safety.

In the meantime, I'd like to encourage parents and adults in general to model safe riding behavior by putting on a helmet—even if isn't required—yielding at intersections, using hand signals, and in general demonstrating safe, defensive riding as you're out and about on a bike, scooter, or that rad skateboard you've been riding since the 90's.

We want Bexley to be a place where kids can enjoy the freedom of movement—but we also want them to make it home safely. Let's work together to promote awareness, model safe behavior, and ensure our community continues to thrive as a walkable, rideable, and safe place for residents of all ages.

Ever walk down Main Street and notice how it makes you feel? At its best, the expansive tree canopy, generous sidewalks, welcoming storefronts, and eclectic architecture all come together to create a uniquely "Bexley" experience. These elements—our built environment, the surrounding trees and landscape, and our attention to detail—make streets feel safer, more welcoming, and more interesting to walk or bike along.

For decades, Bexley has worked to uphold high standards for architectural quality and streetscape design in our commercial areas. Our Main Street Design Guidelines (adopted in 2002), along with our zoning code and a thoughtful planning review process, have helped ensure new developments and infrastructure projects reflect those values—incorporating architectural details, green elements, and pedestrian-friendly features.

But after more than 20 years, it's time for an update, to reflect on what has worked well, and what improvements in our guidelines can help craft the next generation of Bexley's story. The City is launching an initiative to modernize our Main Street Design Guidelines and expand them to include all commercial corridors in Bexley—including Livingston and Cassady Avenues. These updated Commercial Design Guidelines, developed alongside our near-complete Land Use Strategy, will help shape the future of Bexley's business districts and community spaces.

To kick things off, in April we invited renowned urban planner and *Walkable City* author Jeff Speck to conduct a "walkability audit." Speck and his team praised many of Bexley's existing assets—from our vibrant tree canopy and recent infrastructure improvements (like the landscaped medians and bump-outs on Drexel), to the overall character of our buildings and streetscape.

At the same time, they also identified opportunities for growth: reducing travel lane widths (aka "street diets"), improving on-street parking, rethinking road striping, and enhancing public spaces with murals, outdoor seating, and other creative elements.

These recommendations will feed directly into guiding principles that the newly formed Commercial Design Guidelines Steering Committee will put to use as they work with planning firm McKenna over the next nine months to shape the next chapter of Bexley's commercial districts.

And of course—in true Bexley fashion—we want your voice to be part of the guideline development process. Join us for the first Commercial Design Guidelines Public Workshop at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, July 10 at City Hall. Stay tuned for more information at bexleydesignguidelines.com and look for a community survey launching this summer!



Introducing the BEXLEY "FREEDGE"

Later this summer, the City is proud to launch our very first freedge—a free community refrigerator aimed at reducing food waste and helping our neighbors in need. Think of it like a Little Free Pantry, but with the ability to safely store fresh, perishable, and frozen foods. The Bexley Freedge will be open to the public, offering a simple way for individuals and businesses to share extra food that might otherwise go to waste—and for anyone in need to take what they need, no questions asked.

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When donating, we ask that items are:

- whole and unopened (no open packages or sliced produce);
- · labeled with date and ingredients or potential allergens;
- prepackaged from a licensed kitchen or retailer;
- · individually portioned, if possible;

Keep an eye on the Bexley Blast for an online donation sign up system, and admire the Bexley Freedge as it's being constructed near the side access gate to the North Community Garden. Thanks to the Bexley Community Foundation and No Child Goes Hungry for sponsoring this project.



The Bexley Community Improvement Corporation (BCIC) is seeking bold, creative, and community-serving proposals for the transformation of a key commercial property at 2220 E. Livingston Avenue (the former site of Lucky Lotto).

Located on a fast-moving, auto-oriented corridor, this site has sat underutilized for years—but that's about to change. We're launching a 6-week community challenge to select a visionary tenant or partner to bring this site to life as a model for adaptive reuse and corridor revitalization. Proposals will be evaluated on a number of criteria including community value, financial viability, rental rate, and parking dependence.

To support this community-serving business, the BCIC will provide a lightly renovated building with the following (other improvements will be up to the tenant):

From the Council Dias LEAP TOGETHER


Dear Bexley Residents,

I recently heard some great life advice from Kermit the Frog. While he said "it's not easy being green" (pun intended!), Kermit also recommended we should strive to "listen more, make connections and remember that life is better when we leap together." His sage wisdom came during his commencement speech address at the University of Maryland where my oldest daughter was a graduate. As President of Bexley City Council, this amphibious advice rings true with me as we kick off the summer season in our extraordinary Bexley community.

Your City Council continues to be busy writing, evaluating, and voting on important legislation that impacts our residents. For example, at just our May 27 meeting alone, Council considered 10 different pieces of legislation ranging the proposed speed limit of 25 on Drexel Avenue, to whether Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) should be permitted, to reviewing financial appropriations. For a wider perspective, your City Council passed 51 pieces of legislation in 2024 involving:

- Fees for electric vehicle charging stations;
- Funding summer meals with DARN;
- Appointing smart and experienced residents to many of our boards and commissions;
- Installing life-saving AED devices around town;
- Adding protective helmet requirements for our children riding e-bikes or similar vehicles;
- Requiring the securing and fencing of building sites during certain construction activities;
- The unifiying of Commonwealth Park East with Commonwealth Park West; and
- Passing a balanced budget that raised our city's emergency savings to its highest balance ever and paid down city debt.

During its spring retreat, Council discussed priorities for 2025 which include city finances, infrastructure, police community programs, safety, golf carts, green spaces, Bexley's senior citizens, accessible playgrounds, drones, development, and our beloved arboretum. As we move through 2025, your City Council remains focused on the everyday challenges and opportunities that shape life in Bexley. We



know these issues matter deeply—because they affect all of us. Every voice counts, and your Council is committed to listening, learning, and leading with that in mind.

Speaking of which, a few weeks ago, I attended a New Resident Welcome event where a new Bexley community member told me how much he loves local government. When I asked him why (with a smile on my face), he explained that local governments and local officials get to look into the eyes of the residents they directly serve and create solutions for issues that we can see, hear, and feel from our front yards. The unique size of our Bexley community allows us all to make meaningful connections with each other and to craft solutions to everyday issues. I take very seriously the enormous trust that you have placed in me and I thank my neighbors, fellow residents, and business owners who readily share their opinions with Council on things that matter the most to them.

If we remember to leap together, we can accomplish anything. So spread kindness like confetti and let's all listen more, make connections, and remember that life is better when we "leap together." Kermit would be proud.

■ INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS UPDATE

Construction season is underway, with multiple major projects now active throughout the Bexley community. As a reminder, please use extreme caution when driving, biking, or walking near an active construction area. When driving, please proceed slowly and be prepared to stop when workers are present. We appreciate your patience and care in keeping our crews safe! For more frequent street project updates, stay tuned to *bexley.org/street-projects* and subscribe to the Bexley Blast. In particular, keep an eye out for active construction in the following areas:



2200 E. MAIN STREET - THE FITZGERALD REDEVELOPMENT

The sidewalk on the north side of Main between College and Parkview will be closed for several weeks. The sidewalk to the south will remain open. Periodic and temporary lane closures may also occur on Main Street to facilitate construction.



N. COLUMBIA AVENUE - WATERLINE IMPROVEMENTS

The next phase of this project will take place on Columbia between Maryland to North Commonwealth Park. There will be parking restrictions on the street and temporary road closures to through traffic during working hours. Access to local residents will be maintained. Please check with the workers on site if you need assistance accessing a residence.



STANBERY AVENUE - WATERLINE IMPROVEMENTS

Work is substantially complete on the water main installation and street resurfacing. Some minor pavement marking and punch list work will be completed to finalize this project.

CITY OF COLUMBUS UPDATE: CASSADY AVENUE CONSRUCTION

The City of Columbus has started work on North Cassady Avenue that will create a lengthy traffic pattern change on Cassady north of the railroad tracks just north of Delmar. BRT STATION LOCATION UPDATE

Thanks to the Bexley Community for Your Input

After months of meaningful community engagement—including one-on-one conversations, small group discussions, an online survey, and formal public comment—Bexley City Council voted to support the proposed Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) station at Pleasant Ridge and Main Street. This process was more than a procedural step—it was a collective effort to ensure Bexley's voice helped shape the future of regional transit and how it interacts with our streetscape and community. The time spent listening, reflecting, and refining was well worth it. Public input directly influenced several design considerations and action items that City staff will carry forward as plans develop.

Pleasant Ridge and Main emerged as the preferred location following a comprehensive review of Main Street intersections. Its central position along key housing, retail, and employment corridors—as well as its proximity to Capital University and the Bexley Public Library—make it a strategic and accessible choice. Importantly, the station will be integrated into the existing median at that location and will not alter current traffic patterns, as dedicated bus lanes are not feasible within Bexley's limited Main Street right-of-way.

Looking ahead, City staff will partner closely with COTA to refine design elements, with updates and checkpoints at relevant City boards and commissions. While construction is not expected until 2027, and service is anticipated to begin in 2029, design work and coordination are already underway.
