Elizabeth - Earth and Arbor Month - Saturday, 4/22 - drive up 8 to 11 - EE to reconfirm items being collected via social. Partnership with Rumpke.

Earth and Arbor Day Celebration - 10 - 1 - great opportunity for ppl to learn about Green Bexley. Set up is at 9am. Schneider park. Trash talk with the mayor (not bear). Kathy handling waste management.

Universal recycling - received 2 bids - still in deliberation. Note sent to business and land-owners to review / collaborate. Rumpke has provided lowest bid so far. Meeting with businesses is to socialize them to the opportunity and share rate updates. Good news is that for most businesses the 96 gallon toter @ \$9 / month is adequate in

volume. Uniform service. Also addresses equity challenge associated with multi-family homes and access to composting services.

OSU groups working on projects (ex Climate Action Plan - programs and policies used by other municipalities worth considering for Bexley) for Bexley presenting findings on 4/19. GHG inventory in progress.

Bexley's food waste recycling plan may be on NBC news with Lester Holt this week (timing tbd). Media event organized by SWACO. Information provided, and footage taken but no interview. EE provided an update about the coverage via email.

Mayor's update -

Aggregation as a way to bring renewable energy to residents. Revisiting approach - will approach ESAC once opportunity and costs is clear.

'Freecycling' ordinance - no longer making it illegal to remove items from the trash.

Climate Action Plan, Universal Recycling - mayor excited and strongly supports.

EV fleet update - Ford's pricing has changed. Ford Lightnings no longer financially feasible.

John Eickenbury - compost pilot for high school - toters dropped at the school. May have some process improvements which Addison will address with John and team. Addison has concluded that the high school may not be ready for a compost program. Challenging because high schoolers tend not to eat in the high school. Middle school students are better suited to drive composting. Challenge to get people (students) to show up consistently to volunteer. Middle school presents results of their pilot on 5/10. BHS to help prep the Middle school presenters ahead of the meeting. Take-away for now is that this will be Middle-school focused after the High School pilot concludes this week.

Corey Baker - CSG - some challenge to find consistent student volunteers for composting. May 1st is re-start of school wide recycling. Bins in common areas. Custodial staff onboarded re process which involves

teacher responsibility for classroom collection. Addison asked for cost of composting at CSG. CSG senior class also participating in LYA on 5/2.
