



COVID-19 Emergency Orders Update

New orders were issued May 29th to extend through June 30th. These orders included the following:

- Guidance for individual health checks
- Temporary lift of single use plastics ban
- Temporary provisions for temporary commercial signage
- Hold on water shut-offs and water/sewer late fees
- Temporary provisions for temporary restaurant patio expansions
- Guidance regarding tennis courts
- Suspension of block party permits
- Prohibition against refusing service based upon public wearing face coverings
- Guidance regarding wearing masks in public spaces

A Front Yard Fourth of July

Our 4th of July planning teams have been working hard to bring you a fun and safe Independence Day this year! While our activities won't look the same as they have before, we are excited to bring the fun of the 4th right to your front yard.

John Barr Front Yard 5K - 8:00 am

This year, we'll be hosting the annual John Barr 5k virtually! Runner and walkers will set out on their own 5K from their front yard and post their results via an app. We're working with Columbus Running Company (CRC) to create a registration link that will be available in next week's Blast.

Front Yard Parade in the Round - 6:00ish and after

North Bexley AEP Circuit Update

From AEP:

Equipment Replacement

Beginning the week of June 1, lineworkers have begun to address equipment issues found during inspections completed over the last several weeks. Equipment to be repaired or replaced includes cutouts, arresters, crossarms transformers and insulators. To ensure the safety of our men and women, small pockets of outages may occur while the work is taking place. These outages are expected to last 60-90 minutes. We expect to notify affected customers 48 hours in advance of the outage. Please be assured our crews will work as quickly as they safely can to complete the work and get your power back on.

Forestry

Last spring we trimmed back and cleared trees within our right-of-way that posed a threat to your electric service. Over the next few weeks, we'll conduct another round of inspections to identify additional trees that could interfere with your electric service. Some trees may be considered for removal in the most dense areas and we'll work with city officials and property owners on the best course of action, especially for those that fall outside of our right-of-way. As always, the goal is to prevent longer and unpredictable future outages by keeping hazardous trees away from our power lines and other equipment.

COVID-19 Hard Costs

- \$30,000 was encumbered for COVID-19 related expenses via Ordinance 21-20
- \$9,769.22 spent to date

Expense categories:

- PPE Purchasing
- Volunteer Coordinator Supplies
- Printing
- Remote Work Technology
- Remote Meetings Technology

COVID-19 Additional Employment Costs

Authorized by Section 1 of Ordinance 22-20

- \$50,000 was encumbered for COVID-19 related expenses via Ordinance 22-20
- \$4,214.15 spent to date

COVID-19 Employment Temporary Paid Time Off Arrangements **Authorized by Section 3 of Ordinance 22-20**

- For six weeks during late March through early May, Service Department operated on two teams in order to spread out workers
- Alternate teams that were not working still were being paid
- The cost of paying these employees was already built into the 2020 budget and therefore was not an additive COVID-19 expense
- However, the previously appropriated and budgeted cost of payroll for during this time associated with additional paid time off is estimated at \$76,307.20

Shared Work Ohio Program

Reduced hours through end of July

- Commenced May 18th
- Employees across multiple departments with reduced work hours
- Employees are eligible for unemployment benefits and CARES act benefits
- Savings to the City projected in excess of \$100,000
