Bike and Pedestrian Safety Note

Last weeks' Blast article re: safe travel to school was prompted by a student cyclist being struck while crossing Main Street this morning. While thankfully he didn't suffer serious injury, we take any pedestrian or cyclist accident incredibly seriously and I've already worked closely with Chief Lewis and Bexley schools to evaluate this incident, and to incorporate any takeaways into an existing bike-focused engineering look at the area.

Driver responsibility is a critical factor, and we're redoubling our already enhanced efforts around traffic safety based enforcement. One thing is for certain - no matter what we do from a traffic calming or infrastructure perspective, the most important lesson for our kids is to practice defensive behavior - wearing helmets, using bike lights, walking bikes through intersections if using the crosswalk, and most importantly keeping a close eye on drivers to make sure they're stopping and paying attention.

In addition to ongoing enforcement efforts, we are all working consistently and with focus to enhance pedestrian and bike safety through infrastructure. Here are a couple recent and upcoming projects focused around bike/ped safety:



Drexel Pedestrian Enhancements

The Drexel Avenue project aimed to slow traffic speed and provide safer pedestrian crossings, and it has delivered. With meaningful reductions in average speed, and pedestrian crossings that feature shorter crosswalks and much improved pedestrian visibility, this project has been a success for enhanced pedestrian safety.



Calm Corridors Project

The Calm Corridors Project brings enhanced traffic calming to Cassingham and Remington, connecting Bexley's three elementary schools. Features will include narrowed intersections, tabletop intersections in key areas, limited bike lanes, plantings, and enhanced signage. Currently in engineering, with funding proposals connected to the LinkUs issue.



Alum Creek Ped/Bike Bridge

The Alum Creek bridge, located at Schneider Park, will provide safe crossing to the Alum Creek Greemways Trail. With over \$1,000,000 in grant funding received on the project, it is in the advanced stages of engineering, and due for 2025 construction.



Bike Boulevards

Bexley's 5 Bike Boulevards are in advanced planning, with wayfinding details complete and sign contract RFP being prepared and road marking engineering under way. Anticipated date of install is Spring, 2025.



Livingston Avenue Multi-Use Path

The Livingston Multi-Use Path will bring protected bike and pedestrian ways to the north and south sides of Livingston, as part of the Federally funded joint infrastructure project.

These are some of the projects under way. Additional projects include Main Street bike/ped bridge improvements; Trail town work; Cassady bike infrastructure planning, and more! Many of these projects will be referenced during our 2025 budget process - stay tuned for more details!

Bexley Police - Agency of the Month








Do You Know About LinkUs Transit-Supported Infrastructure?

TSI is a key component of the LinkUs proposal, bringing bike and pedestrian friendly improvements to the region. Bexley's first round of LinkUs TSI fund proposals includes around \$3.6 million of bike and pedestrian improcements, including Calm Corridors project; enhance bike/ped accomodation at the Main Street bridge; and assistance with the Livingston Avenue infrastructure project.



Drexel Avenue Paving

After delays from ODOT (ODOT is responsible for paving Drexel Avenue) and recent rainy weather, we are finally closing in on the final wrap-up of the South Drexel project. ODOT contractors are finishing up the final mill and overlay project. Once the surfacing is finished, we'll refine crosswalk and roadway markings as needed and will finally be able to call this project complete!

Watching the clear increase in pedestrian crossings on Drexel due to the calmer traffic and enhanced/increased crossings has been a really rewarding outcome of this project, but it has definitely been difficult to be patient through the delays. Many thanks to all who have been impacted by this project - thank you for your patience throughout!

Livingston Avenue Update - Next Steps

Last week, we facilitated a town hall meeting regarding Livingston Avenue to discuss current conditions, safety enhancements made to date, and the major changes to come in the federally funded project that is underway. With Columbus Police and Service/Engineering staff on hand to help answer questions and take feedback, we had great attendance and great dialogue, and from it several questions which require a little more research to answer.
