

ORDINANCE NO. 30-46

Authorizing contract to purchase necessary radio equipment to change radio cruiser from the two-way system to F. M. system, and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BEAVER, STATE OF OHIO

Section 1. That, whereas in the opinion of Council it is necessary for the efficient operation of the radio cruisers of the Police Department to change the radio system from the present two-way system to the F. M. system, which will require the purchase of certain radio equipment, and which equipment can be obtained from only one source, being the Galvin Manufacturing Corporation, of Chicago, which fact renders it useless and impracticable to advertise for bids for the purchase of such equipment, and whereas said Galvin Manufacturing Corporation offers to accept the present two-way equipment in exchange upon said F. M. equipment at a cash price of \$_____, the Mayor and Auditor are hereby authorized to enter into a contract, without advertisement, for the purchase of the necessary radio equipment to change the present two-way cruiser radio equipment to the F. M. system, and to exchange thereon the present equipment in use in the two-way system.

Section 2. That the sum of \$1800.00 be and the same is hereby appropriated from the General Fund for the above purpose.

Section 3. This ordinance is an emergency measure, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, said emergency being that the Police Department is in need of said equipment in its daily operations, and said ordinance shall go into full force and effect upon the passage thereof.
